Lutheranism and the Justice of Mercy

Depending on the mood you're in this will be one of the lamest Christmas gifts you'll receive this year, or one of the most mediocre. For Christmas, I give you: *A Theological Reflection on the Justice of God's Mercy*.

Recently I had conversation with a friend from a different denomination of Christianity. We agree on a lot, and we disagree on some. One of the things we disagree upon is around this question:

Does God's grace save people who don't believe in Jesus, or those who do grave evils?

As much as we might not like it, I think the answer is *probably yes*. My friend thinks the answer is *absolutely not*. He bases his argument on justice: "If God is just, how could God allow the salvation of the wicked or unbelieving? That wouldn't be fair."

Maybe. Maybe not.

I'd respond with a few questions of my own: *Is it even fair to punish a sinful humanity?* Especially when, according to Scripture, we're born into and cannot rise above it (cf. Genesis 8:21; Jeremiah 17:9; Romans 7, et al). Therefore, if sin is inevitable and inescapable, is it really just for God to punish people for doing what they cannot avoid!? To me that's like being angry at the dog that *you* lost.

Opening doors to life in Christ.

And what about those who never had a real opportunity to believe? What about those the church has abused and left so wounded that belief feels impossible or painful? Is it truly just of God to punish them!?

My friend thinks that God's mercy and God's justice are at odds. I think God's mercy IS God's justice – and that God's sense of fairness and justice transcends ours. Think of the 'Parable of the Laborers in the Vineyard' (Matthew 20:1-16) where all are paid the same wage despite working different hours. God's love and mercy transcends our ideas of fairness and justice.

Lutheranism has historically leaned into this concept. Scripture reveals again and again that God's grace violates our notions of fairness and justice. This, I think, is where Lutheranism makes its most daring claim: there is no earning salvation through works or belief, because it's already been accomplished through the faithfulness and love of God, most clearly in the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

Because of this, Lutherans have sometimes been called *antinomian* (that is, anti-law). Others accuse Lutheran theology of *universalism* - that our theology of grace implies *everyone* is saved and no one is damned...which some find offensive, because, again, it appears unjust. But Lutheranism neither affirms nor denies universal salvation. Instead, we emphasize God's incomprehensible grace and leave the rest to God.

So, when the question comes, "Is it fair if the wicked or unbeliever is saved?" – the Lutheran answer doesn't so much solve the problem as it reframes it. God's love, as revealed in Scripture, isn't concerned with fairness; it's concerned with setting people free and restoring relationship. Mercy doesn't erase justice but fulfills it in a different key.

Justice, in God's economy, aims not at balancing the scales but at restoring relationship. The cross makes this plain: a sentence is delivered to a sinful world, and that sentence is merciful love, not punishment. Therefore, mercy is not unjust; it is scandalously just, because it prioritizes gracious restoration over retribution. That's who God is, and it's really hard for a world that doesn't operate that way to understand. As Paul wrote, the gospel is *foolish* according to the world's wisdom (see 1 Corinthians 1:25).

The whole arc of Scripture reveals God's justice bending this direction – toward restoration more than retaliation. After the flood, God's regret (Genesis 6:6) and covenant to never to destroy again (Genesis 9:11) mark a divine turn from retribution to restoration. With Abraham (Genesis 18) and Moses (Exodus 32), God's justice becomes negotiated, relational, and even self-questioning!

And that arc reaches its fullness when God chooses to be united to and born among the world that constantly betrays him (John 1:1-5; 3:16-17). It reaches its fullness again in the cross, where even the murderers of God are forgiven by God (Luke 23:34)! And it reaches its fullness once more in the resurrection, where God returns to a world that just killed him, a clearest sign of God's commitment to grace over revenge.

Throughout the Bible, God's ultimate judgment is mercy, not retribution, showing the ultimate form of divine justice is not balancing scales, but restoring relationship. Through Christ's birth, death, and resurrection, God keeps returning to us, rather than casting us out – despite sin, wickedness, and even unbelief; God keeps returning to us, not with revenge, but peace (John 20:19-23; Romans 5:10).

So, my friend might be right to call it unfair, but if true, then *unfairness* is God's justice, because apparently God would rather be merciful, than fair. And that's the scandal of grace we celebrate at Christmas.

One of the presentations was entitled Piety. The Cambridge dictionary defines piety as a strong belief in a religion that is shown in the way someone lives. Piety is a devotion. At the retreat, we were told that piety is the way you consider your relationship with Christ. It isn't so much what you do in your life of faith, but rather how you think about the way your actions bring you closer to Jesus. It's a state of mind. When have you felt especially close to Christ?

Another presentation was called Study. I think we can all recall a time when we studied for something in school to help us be successful later on in life. Studying in our faith life can help us as well. Getting to know our Bible and studying what Jesus actually said and did in His ministry can help us navigate our roller coaster lives. One method of study occurs every worship service as we hear the Gospel proclaimed and hear sermons that bring that message closer to home. What have you studied lately that has increased your understanding of faith?

A third presentation was Action. We all learned that action is a process of doing something. We are not to sit quietly at home with our Bibles in our laps and never apply biblical lessons. We are not built that way. How can we apply our piety and study to make a difference in our lives and the lives of others? Is it through volunteerism at FLC or the food pantry? Do we take action to help our neighbor in need? What have you done, as a disciple of Christ, to share Him with others?

As some of you have probably guessed by now, I am trying to prompt and encourage you to transition from being simply a participant in the pew to being an active and vibrant member of the body of Christ. The new year is a time to reflect and renew. Whether you decide to be more attentive to your personal devotional time, attend or start a Bible study, or be more active in FLC or community ministries, you can strengthen your relationship with Jesus this year.



“The Chosen” | Video Bible


Tuesdays at 1 p.m.

She sat pensively for a few moments, then cautiously said, "Well, there is something I have asked my Mom for the last two years, but she hasn't gotten it for me. That's the only thing I can think of." She told me what it was, and I wondered if there was a reason her Mom had not given her that before, because she always got "fun" presents amid the more functional ones.

Grandma took too long to respond and that gave her lively mind time to wonder. Thoughtfully, she hinted "Maybe you and Auntie Vanessa and Odelia and Addie could go together on it. I looked the item up online and it was not that expensive at all. After a quick call to get the okay from her Mom, I ordered it.

Her suggestion that family members could come together to make something that seemed out of reach happen stuck with me. We live in a culture that prioritizes independence above almost all else. But that was not God's intent for us, either from Him directly or His Son Jesus.

In loving each other as Jesus spoke to us, together we care for and support those in need. To share God's message of love and grace, we are to come together as the body of Christ, because we can do so much more together to accomplish the work God has set out for us than we could ever do alone.

I sometimes take that independent stance beyond the point where it is helpful. I need to remember Oaklyn's words also, that in unity and with prayerful consideration, we can do all things with God Who strengthens us.
