Did you know that:

- The Synod's Staff and specially trained leaders offer free Adaptive Leadership Training, and free Coaching to our Vision Council and other leaders, strengthening relationships, for their important work in our church?
- There's a "People's Church" in our Synod? It's a multicultural congregation in Bemidji who minister with folks living in poverty and homelessness and addressing needs together faithfully.
- We have a "New Journey Lutheran Parish" where four congregations have developed a faithful ministry sharing pastors, resources and leaders.
- Our Synod is hosting a "Fueling our Farmers" free lunch event on Saturday, October 7th at the First Lutheran Church in Audubon from 11-1! This is to thank our faithful farmers for caring for us all with their work in the fields. (See poster below)
- Our church (FLC!), along with the Synod staff, is hosting a "Living into God's Generosity" day on Saturday, October 28th from 9:00 – 3:00. All are welcome to talk about stewardship and fundraising as <u>ministry</u> – Anyone can sign up and it's only \$25/person if we have four or more people attending!
- NWMN Synod has a Facebook "Resource Swap" page so if our church needs something or has something to give away we can post it and share with other churches!
- A LIFE-CHANGING, FAITH FORMATION EVENT is happening next July 16-20 in New Orleans at our ELCA Gathering for Youth (Middle and High School), and (this is new) for Young Adults (18-35) ! Some of you (like me) may remember going to the ELCA Youth Events and how impactful they are – please encourage our youth and young adults to attend – and if you're able – please consider sponsoring someone so they can attend!

We have a wonderful Synod Staff who are very available to help us all, and are happy to talk with you more about any questions, concerns, suggestions and ideas you have. I am very grateful for that as the fall schedule starts! I'm hoping by the time you read this we are welcoming our new (Director of Youth and Family Ministry.) Pastor Joe and the rest of our staff and volunteers have done a lot of extra work to keep all the Sunday and Wednesday school programs running smoothly. Please thank them when you see them. The parking lot looks wonderful and the brick repair in front of the outdoor worship is in process. And I believe the HVAC repairs are done. Just a reminder that the loan payment we will have for the bricks, parking lot and part of the HVAC repair, is built into our budget this year and we are hoping to pay it off sooner to save on the interest. What you need to know about: COVID, RSV, SEASONAL FLU

Flu season has started! With school back in session and everyone spending more time inside, there is a rise in respiratory illnesses. Vaccines are available to help prevent getting seriously ill from Covid, Seasonal Flu, and RSV. Following is the most up to date information, as of September 21st, from the MN Department of Health and the CDC on the vaccines available for these illnesses.

2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine recommendations

- Children 6 months through 4 years of age should complete a primary series including either 2 doses of Moderna or 3 doses of Pfizer vaccine, with at least one of the doses being the new 2023-2024 mRNA COVID-19 vaccine. If they had completed a primary series prior, one dose of the new 2023-2024 vaccine should be given at least 2 months after any previous dose.
- People 5 years of age and older should receive 1 dose of the new 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine. If they have received any previous COVID-19 vaccine, the new 2023-2024 vaccine should be given at least 2 months after any previous dose.
- **People who are immunocompromised** should have 3 doses with at least one of the doses being the new 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine. They may also receive additional 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine doses based on their clinical situation.
- **People over 65 years of age**: there is currently no recommendation to receive more than one 2023-2024 vaccine dose; this may be updated as more data become available.

This updated vaccination is especially important for people at high-risk of hospitalization and death. Rates of COVID-19 are rising throughout the country and protection from previous vaccination and disease is waning.

Who should get a flu vaccine this season?

Everyone 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine every season with rare exceptions. Vaccination is particularly important for people who are at higher risk of serious complications from influenza. This includes people 65 years and older, people of any age with certain chronic medical conditions (such as asthma, diabetes, or heart disease), pregnant people and children younger than 5 years, but especially those younger than 2 years old. Flu vaccination has important benefits. It can reduce flu illnesses, visits to doctor's offices, and missed work and school due to flu, as well as make symptoms less severe and reduce flu-related hospitalizations and deaths.

Who should talk to their healthcare provider about RSV vaccination?

Adults 60 years and older should talk with their health care provider about whether RSV vaccination is right for them. There is no maximum age for getting RSV vaccination. RSV vaccine is given as a single dose. If you're 60 or older, your health care provider might recommend RSV vaccination for you, especially if you have a weakened immune system from illness (e.g., leukemia or HIV infection) or from medications (e.g., treatment for cancer or organ transplant), if you have chronic medical conditions such as heart or lung disease, or if you live in a nursing home. If any of those apply to you, you might be at higher risk of severe RSV disease and an RSV vaccine could help prevent serious illness.



Where The Light Fell




YANCEY

But from there you will seek the Lord your God, and you will find Him if you search for Him with all your heart and all your soul. When you are in distress and all these things have come upon you, in the latter days you will return to the Lord your God and listen to His voice. Deuteronomy 4:29-30

"Me and my friend at preschool wish we had straight hair." Her melancholic voice drifted from the back seat of my car.

"Oh, but Honey, I love your beautiful curls." No more comment came from the back seat. My response left her feeling unheard and left me not showing any true understanding of her feelings.

I had fallen into the all-too-human trap of not listening with my heart and soul, of hearing the words but not truly "listening" for meaning. We do that over 70% of the time, thinking about what we would like to interject while the other person is still expressing their thoughts or feelings. There are many reasons we do it – wanting to fix or help the situation, wanting to be recognized or have our voices heard, not being open to differing ideas or points of view, and other reasons.




In my eagerness to "fix" her feelings, I left her feeling unheard, her thoughts and feelings unimportant and invalidated. By trying to make her feel better, I had not shown her the loving compassion and kindness I should have.

I wonder how often God wonders about all barriers we erect that prevent us from truly listening to His voice. My busyness, all life's peripheral noise, attempts to stay in control, fear of the unknown. As I grow older, my trust in God has grown, but we never stop growing in our relationship with God. Making God the first priority in my life, giving control over to God, totally trusting that he hears what is buried deepest within me and, letting Him guide me toward the peace that only His compassionate love and understanding bring.

I still love Oaklyn's "crazy hair." I never discovered why she felt as she did, whether she did not like the way her hair looked or whether she just dreaded brush-out time. I wish I could invent a brush that would untangle those curls with-out causing pain. Those curls that dance around her face are such an extension of her joy and energy.

I hope remembering this experience will help me become a better listener in the future, and that I will get better at listening for understanding and offering a compassionate ear and heart is so I can truly show love to others.

It is for anyone interested in learning how to explore a caring critical examination of the meaning of life with others. For some, their sense of purpose is rooted in religious beliefs and for others it is in philosophically oriented

worldviews that are as far away from religion as they can get. Either way, this work is for whoever desires to study the deep mysteries of life with friends,..."

Compassionate, convicted, and civil conversations about religion with Hammerling and his book sound intriguing... so why not join the study on Sunday, October 22, and Sunday, November 5? Books can be purchased through Amazon Books or Thrift Books or the Bluebird Book Store here in Detroit Lakes.
