Finally, I want to thank Pastor Matthew. His vocational discernment, layered with unforeseen and traumatic personal events, has been a heavy dynamic for him to wade through. And yet, he has waded through it with authenticity, integrity, and sincere commitment to this community and his colleagues. So, I give thanks for his authenticity and high character.

Indeed, we grieve his departure from the ministry. We lament that this is how things unfolded. And, still, we give thanks — for all that he has offered us, especially amid adversity. Once more, a lot for which to be thankful.


On ahead we go, friends, together in Christ Jesus! I look forward to another year of being church together with all of you. I am full of hope.

The meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer at 11:40 AM.



The Four Things That Matter Most by Ira Byock, M.D.. The inspiring stories in The Four Things That Matter Most demonstrate the usefulness of the Four Things in a wide range of life situations. They also show that a degree of emotional healing is always possible and that we can experience a sense of wholeness even in the wake of family strife, personal tragedy, divorce, or in the face of death. With practical wisdom and spiritual punch, *The Four Things That Matter Most* gives us the language and guidance to honor and experience what really matters most in our lives every day.



Amish Grace: How Forgiveness Transcended Tragedy by Donald B. Kraybill. In a world where repaying evil with evil is almost second nature, the Amish remind us there's a better way. In plain and beautiful prose, Amish Grace recounts the Amish witness and connects it to the heart of their spirituality. This balanced presentation blends history, current evaluation of American society, and an examination of what builds community into a seamless story that details the shootings while it probes the religious beliefs that led to such quick forgiving.



Beautiful Mercy: Experiencing God's Unconditional Love So We Can Share It with Others by Pope Francis. Giving and receiving mercy is central to living a life of passion and purpose. Yet, for some reason, most people believe they are either too young or too old, not religious enough, or simply don't have enough time to live a life uncommon. The perfect companion for the Year of Mercy called for by Pope Francis, it inspires readers to realize that extraordinary acts of love are possible for anyone no matter where they are in life.



Fierce: Women of the Bible and Their Stories by Alice Connor. Women in the Bible aren't shy or retiring; they're fierce and funny and demanding and relevant to 21st-century people. Some of their names we know, others we've only heard, and others are tragically unnamed. Fierce invites us to see them not as players in a man's story as victims or tempters nor as morality archetypes, but as fierce foremothers of the faith. These women's stories are messy, challenging, and beautiful. When we read their stories, we can see not only their particular, fearsome lives but also our own.



Jennifer: An O'Malley Love Story by Dee Henderson. Dee Henderson returns to the world of The O'Malley Series to share the untold story of Jennifer--the youngest O'Malley sibling! After finding God and falling in love, life is good for Dr. Jennifer O'Malley. But can her faith--and her family--survive the challenges ahead?




Moral Ground – Ethical Action for a Planet in Peril by Kathleen Dean Moore & Michael P. Nelson. *Moral Ground* brings together the testimony of over 80 visionaries: theologians and religious leaders, scientists, elected officials, business leaders, naturists, activists, and writers to present a diverse and compelling call to honor our individual and collective moral responsibilities to our planet. In the face of environmental degradation and global climate change, scientific knowledge alone does not tell us what we ought to do. The missing premise of the argument and much-needed centerpiece in the debate to date has been the need for ethical values, moral guidance, and principled reasons for doing the right thing for our planet, its animals, its plants, and its people.
