PRESIDENT'S POST

Update from Vision Council President Gail Colby

Happy Easter and Happy Spring First Lutheran Church!

We have many volunteer opportunities here at First Lutheran. I want to encourage you to pray about where your passions are in serving your church. The Vision Council has approved our Nominating Committee for this year. The Nominating Committee is the group that finds members for our upcoming vacancies on our various committees we have at FLC.

The Vision Council is responsible for the overall business of the church and provides visionary and strategic leadership for the congregation. It consists of four officers and six At Large members that have three-year terms. They meet monthly.



The Personnel Committee assists with work such as employee policies, reviews and compensation. They have a chairman and 4 members with three-year terms. They meet every other month.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee is responsible for the management and care of all real and physical property owned by the congregation, in collaboration with the Vision Council. They have a chairman and 5 members. They meet monthly.

Our Stewardship Committee reviews giving patterns in the FLC congregation and may also research and recommend opportunities for funding campaigns. They have a chairman and 4 members. They meet at least quarterly.

The Foundation Board works to serve the mission of the church through financial giving exclusively for the charitable, religious, literary, or educational purposes. They have 4 officers and 5 at Large members. They meet quarterly.

Sometimes people think they need to have some special skills to a part of these committees. For that reason, I am asking each of you to pray about the things you feel passionate about. Some of our members of these committees do have special skills, which we are very grateful for. Some of us, such as myself, do not. I feel very fortunate to be surrounded by Pastors, staff and other committee members that support and mentor me to help me accomplish the tasks at hand. I always learn a lot and enjoy the fellowship that occurs. If you chose to not be on a committee, please continue to volunteer and be apart of other serving you do. Every part is important and we are very grateful for you! If you are asked to serve on a committee, whether it is the right time for you or not, know that it is a compliment. We value you and we see you as someone that values all of our members, young and mature, at FLC and members of our community.

Jesus chose his twelve disciples from all different walks of life. I'm up to season 3 in watching "The Chosen". Jesus is becoming more famous; his preaching and word of his miracles are spreading from city to city. He pairs up his disciples and instructs them to go out on their own and cast out demons and perform healings. Little James, who has a disability of his own, wasn't sure how he would go out to heal other people when he was crippled. He asked Jesus why he hadn't healed him or if it was possible. Little James had seen many miracles so, of course, he knew it was possible. Jesus said, "I haven't healed you because I trust you." What?! So Jesus explained that if he healed Little James, then he also, would have a story of a miracle to tell. There will be hundreds and even thousands more miracle stories that will be told. But if Jesus send him out proclaiming God, praising God, and healing people, despite his own difficulty, what an amazing site that would be! He could show people that he knew how to focus on so much more than the body. He could show people that he could be patient with his suffering here on earth because he will spend eternity with no suffering. Jesus said not everyone understands that and that God doesn't trust this to everyone. Little James said that even though he knows he is "fearfully and wonderfully made" he didn't feel like less of a burden to the other disciples. Jesus would not allow Little James to speak that way of himself and assured him the he would accomplish more for Jesus than some people ever dream of! He told him that some people need to be healed to believe, but that was not the case for Little James. Many are healed or not healed because the father in heaven has a plan for them. That plan may be a mystery. Jesus told him that when he discovers himself doing great things because of his weakness and when he does great things in Jesus's name in spite of his disability, the impact will last for generations.

April is Stress Awareness Month

Let's face it, our lives can be very stressful and it's crucial to recognize the impact of stress on our overall well-being. April marks Stress Awareness Month, a time dedicated to raising awareness about stress and its effects on mental and physical health. Stress, when managed poorly, can lead to a myriad of health issues including anxiety, depression, heart disease, and weakened immune function. By understanding the triggers of stress and implementing effective coping mechanisms, individuals can take proactive steps to mitigate its negative effects and lead healthier, more balanced lives.

Stress affects people of all ages and backgrounds. Whether it's due to work pressures, financial worries, relationship strains, or other life challenges, stress can take a toll on both our minds and bodies. Stress Awareness Month provides a timely reminder to prioritize self-care and mental health awareness. 
Looking Ahead

Immediately He made the disciples get into the boat and go ahead of Him to the other side, while He sent the crowds away. After He had sent the crowds away, He went up on the mountain by Himself to pray, and when it was evening, He was there alone. Matthew 14:22-23

Oaklyn's thrill of reading is only matched by her joy in writing. Notes like the above, menus for her restaurant of plastic food, and transcriptions of recipes previously held only in Grandma's memory. My family cookbook now contains our pancake recipe with a "secret ingredient" flourish contributed by Oaklyn.

While she was writing one day, I caught a glimpse of one pointer finger placed carefully on the page, then she continued writing, her finger marking the end of each word. Apparently, she was taught that, recognized her note recipients sometimes took a long time to read her messages, or realized books, road signs, cereal boxes had spaces between words. Spaces that bring clarity to ideas. Spaces elucidated her thoughts, intentions, and feelings.

The walls at her home, my house, and Mimi and Papa's are papered with Oaklyn's artwork and notes. It's fun to see how she's progressed as the months and years tick by. Her first notes, with words compressed together prompt me to consider my own life. No matter how hard I try to keep an organized schedule, things sometimes just pile up and the path ahead can become cloudy or confusing. How much space do I take in each day to evaluate where I'm going, or whether I'm investing my time and energy the best I can in the hours afforded me.

Spring is just around the corner, with all its added busyness in the yard and garden. And I am reminded of my mother who always put "people" things first – family, friends, those in need. So, I seek paths that help strengthen my relationship with God to better love people as He envisioned.


Jesus took time to step away, to pray about, connect with, and share in His Father's vision. He decluttered His mind and spirit from all the noise of the world. His disciples followed His example. "These all with one mind were continually devoting themselves to prayer, along with the women, and Mary the mother of Jese and with His brothers." (Acts 1:14) And I ask myself, how do I set aside time to do the same. I can't "create" extra hours in a day.

But I can try to plan some intentional "space" within each day to pray, read, connect, and hope God's vision for my life becomes manifest. 


THE LUTHERANS IN NORTH AMERICA—This book gives today's Lutherans a sense of heritage, identity and continuity, a sense of self-understanding. Readers will see themselves as part of a family. They can identify with the struggles, hopes, and frustrations of wave after wave of immigrants adapting to the strange new world of America and at the same time trying to preserve all they had known and loved and brought with them from the homeland. The genius of the entire volume is that it points beyond family memories to an ongoing and continuing life of which we and our children are a living part.



GREED ECONOMICS AND ETHICS IN CONFLICT—We live in an age of greed. Economic good times and the self-immolation of socialist alternatives have left capitalism unrivaled in popular minds as a way of life a prized set of values and expectations. However, capitalism is not without its downside or its victims. Basic human services and even religion have become commodities. Corporations reorganize for short-term gain at the expense of employees and of their own long-term viability. Increasingly, people see themselves not as citizens but as consumers. First World countries, 15 percent of the globe, account for 86 percent of private consumption. In this important book, Childs probes this disturbing development in its economic and cultural dimensions, gauging contemporary ways in light of Christian ethical principles and investigating a wide range of particular sectors and problems.



Surprised By Joy—C. S. 

As she spends her days with a mother who barely resembles the competent and vigorous woman who bore and raised her, L'Engle delves into her memories, reflecting on the lives of the strong women in her family's history. FOR YOUR INFORMATION

At the May 2023 Northwest Minnesota ELCA Synod Assembly, the book *Growing Young* was introduced to delegates. Our First Lutheran Church delegates brought this resource to our attention.

The authors surveyed, interviewed, observed, and analyzed the workings of nearly 400 church leaders, lay and rostered, from approximately 250 nominated noteworthy growing young congregations. Thus this research is "from the ground of real-life ministry contexts and communities". Experts in the field have said that the book is "incredibly insightful, theologically robust, and practically engaging".

Several members of the FLC Adult Faith Formation team have read the book and taken a class offered by the NW MN ELCA synod staff. When consideration is given to our society's

fast-changing culture and needs of the various generations here at FLC, it seems appropriate that some time and effort be given to the findings within the *Growing Young* book.

A cross-generational task force has been established and given the assignment to read and discuss the content and compare to what is happening and not happening here at FLC. The task force is currently reading the book and will be discussing the content in April. During the discussion, the four goals that our Vision Council has been using in its strategic planning will be incorporated. The task force is working with a target date of May 19, which is the FLC Annual Meeting.

To assist in understanding the dynamics of the *Growing Young* book, the central focus includes six core strategies needed by churches to grow young. Those six strategies are:

- 1. Unlock keychain leadership... empower people from across the generations
- 2. *Empathize with today's younger generations...* instead of judging or criticizing, step into the shoes of these generations
- 3. Take Jesus' message seriously... welcome all into a Jesus-centered way of living
- 4. Fuel a warm community... aim for warm peer and intergenerational friendships
- 5. *Prioritize young people and families everywhere...* look for creative ways to support, resource, and involve them
- 6. Be the best neighbors... learn to "neighbor well" locally and globally

Please watch for updates and progress reports on the workings of the growing young task force. And if this information piqued your interest, stop in the church office and sign out a *Growing Young* book... read, highlight, take notes, and then return for someone else!



Making Connections The Hummel Family



Lynn and Bev Hummel moved to Detroit Lakes in 1961 and joined First Lutheran Church. They found a home about a block from the church halfway up the hill on Minnesota Avenue.

Lynn and Bev both grew up in North Dakota. Lynn in Garrison and Bev in Parshall. They met at Minot State University where Bev was in teacher training and Lynn was in pre-law. They were married in 1959 and lived in Minneapolis where Bev taught $4^{\rm th}$ graders in Circle Pines and Lynn finished law school.

Bev grew up in the Congregational Church and was a new Lutheran having just been confirmed in Minneapolis by Rev. David N. Preus who later became national president at the American Lutheran Church which later merged with the ELCA.

The pastor of First Lutheran Church in 1961 was T.C. Hanson, fully loaded with gospels, a sense of humor and a rich Norwegian accent. Were any current members of First Lutheran members of the church during the Hanson era in 1961?

Joining the Detroit Lakes Communion of Saints, the Hummel family taught Sr. High Sunday School, served on the Vision Council, Call Committees, Foundation Board, FLCW membership and various committees and sang together in the church choir for over 50 years.

In the Detroit Lakes community, Lynn worked as a lawyer and Bev taught school in Callaway for a year before becoming a mother. Both were active in community services and organizations. They traveled to Europe on choir trips organized by Marlys Douglas, then Gene Gaffney. Lynn's main hobby was writing, including four books and a weekly column in the Detroit Lakes Tribune called Pony Express. The family lived continuously in Detroit Lakes to the present time, except for an 18-month period in 1969-1971 when they lived in Boston and Phoenix while on fellowship under the Bush Foundation of St. Paul.

The family includes three children: Jane (now in Fargo), Guy (now in Woodbury, MN) and Sally (now in Perham), 10 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren (both adopted children with down syndrome). All three children were baptized, confirmed and married in First Lutheran Church.

Presently senior citizens and retired, the Hummels continue to enjoy the warmth, love, fellowship and inspiration of the First Lutheran Communion of Saints in worship, birthdays, anniversaries, meetings, social events and funerals.



FLC Tree Give-Away Sunday, May 5, 2024

Last year FLC Creation Care Team (CCT) sponsored a tree give-away. Our goals were to give trees to people to plant, help people connect with the earth, and to promote our care for God's earth. The entire DL community was invited to come to FLC parking lot and pick-up their seedlings. The event was well-received as all 325 trees were given away.

Creatic

This year the CCT will be giving away 300 trees to help offset the effects of global warming. Available species include: Chokecherry, Red Splendor Crabapple, Red (or Norway) Pine, Hackberry, White Pine and White Spruce.

Chokecherry: Adapted to a wide variety of soil types. Grows to 12 to 25 feet tall. Has moderate drought resistance. Will tolerate shaded sites, but likes full sun. Fruits are commonly used for jellies and jams.

Red Splendor Crabapple: Adapted to a wide variety of soil types. Grows to 20 to 30 feet tall. Has moderate drought resistance. Likes full sun. Fruits hang on the branch through winter.

Red (or Norway) Pine: Prefers dry, sandy soils. Grows to 50 to 80 feet tall. Resistance to insects and disease. Likes full sun.

Hackberry: Adapted to a wide variety of soil types. Grows to 40 to 60 feet tall. Has moderate drought resistance. Will tolerate shaded sites, but likes full sun. Fruits are eaten by many birds and mammals.

White Pine: Prefers moist well-drained soils. Grows to 50 to 80 feet tall. Easily transplanted. Likes full sun, but will tolerate shaded sites.

White Spruce: Prefers moist loamy soils. Grows to 40 to 60 feet tall. Tolerant of wind, heat, cold, drought, and crowding. Likes full sun.

Now is the time to consider adding trees to your landscape.

Our CCT will be assembled in the southwest corner of the church parking lot on **Sunday, May 5th from 9:30 to 12:00** am ready to give you 1 to 3 seedlings to plant and enjoy for years to come. Species availability will be first-come, first-serve basis. You are invited to bring a bag/container suitable to carry mulch (free also). A mulch donut helps your young trees survive during the early years of life.

The trees are gifted to you by the Creation Care Team of First Lutheran Church. It is our hope that you and your family will plant, care for, and enjoy this free gift as a celebration of God's wonderful creation. Planting a tree declares hope for the future!

The FLC Quilters need your help! We will be packing quilts to send to Lutheran World Relief in May and some of our shelves are **EMPTY!**



Calendar Year 2023 Family Giving Information

The FLC Stewardship team has been able to gather and analyze financial stewardship data from the last year and compare this data to previous years. One of the comparisons the team looks at is giving by family unit. In the graphic below, you can see how this data from calendar year 2023 compares to data from calendar year 2022. The data from 2023 is the first bar in each of the giving brackets. Cash gifts not in an envelope are not reflected in the data.



There are some things to celebrate and some challenges based on this information. There were <u>392 family giving units in 2023</u>. This is an increase from the number of families in 2022 which was 378. The number of families in the <u>second, third, fourth, and sixth giving brackets increased from 2022.</u> We have a number of families who give less than \$ 50 a year. This is a challenge. The number of families in fifth (approximately \$20 to \$40 a week) and seventh (more than \$90 a week) giving brackets decreased from calendar year 2022. Another challenge.

One of the things your family may want to consider in 2024 is your giving to support the ministries of our church. If you have been giving the same amount for the last several years (ex: \$5 a week or \$20 a month), it may be time to increase your weekly or monthly gift. If your family gives electronically and you have not thought about your giving amount for a while, you might want to re-evaluate that amount. If you want to increase the amount you are giving electronically or start giving electronically, please contact Paul in the church office to help you.

Prayerfully consider your financial gifts to the ministry of First Lutheran Church.

Many thanks to you for giving of your time, talent, and treasure to grow God's mission through First Lutheran Church. Our church family is blessed to have you as a contributing member.
