

President's Message

Dream Big Update

Some folks may be wondering what is happening with Dream Big: Expanding Walls, Expanding Ministry. Here's a snapshot of where we are now and where the Vision Council thinks things will go in the near future.

Presently, the capital campaign has resulted in about \$1.6 million in commitments. Although this number is far short of the goal we set for ourselves, this was a successful campaign. The amount raised thus far is a major step forward in FLC history. As of the January Vision Council meeting, the Dream Big dedicated account had a balance of approximately \$97,800. There are about 166 giving units that have made Dream Big part of their giving efforts for the next 4 years.

The follow-up team is still working to contact those members, friends, and family of FLC who have not turned in a commitment card. If you have not turned in a commitment card yet, you can pick one up in the narthex or church office. The completed cards can be put in the offering plate at worship, mailed back to the office, or physically dropped off at the office.

The Vision Council has decided that these Dream Big funds should be held in interest bearing accounts until such time when expansion/remodeling plans are developed and approved. Obviously, the expansion plans presented at the congregational meeting last September are out of reach for us now. The Vision Council and the Master Planning Team will work with our architects, YHR partners, to develop a design proposal within our financial means that will benefit our growing ministries. Hopefully, this amended plan will be substantive and be ready to show and discuss by the annual meeting in May.

We will be able to make some "behind the scenes" improvements that most of us may not see. For instance, we can make improvements to our aging heating system with an eye toward building improvements. We can also remodel the narthex area to comply with fire codes. Another item we can invest in is the update of our current elevator, which is serving beyond its original design life.

In all of the upcoming discussions, let us all remember the strategic goal here is to provide a safe, healthy, and inviting facility and location to support the thriving ministry of First Lutheran Church. We have much to be thankful for at First Lutheran. We have many gifted ministry leaders. We will work together to develop and implement plans that will impact the future ministry of First Lutheran Church.

Let us continue to walk in faith together.




Sixth–eighth graders, get ready for a night to remember. Join us for an epic filled lock-in at FLC, with tons of activities, games, fellowship, and pizza!

Children's Christmas Store

Thank you to all the people who donated to, prepped for and worked at the Children's Christmas Store on December 6! We had families lined up outside the church waiting to get it before the event started and by the end of the day had 90 children shop in the store! We estimated that 700 gifts were sold! This year we worked with Lakes Crisis Center and gave out "scholarships" to families in need and had several children shop in the store with a baggie of \$1 bills that were gifted to them from the Christmas Store budget. Because of this, our total profit from the event was \$670. The Christmas Store is lucky enough to have generous donors and volunteers which allows us to donate 100% of our profits each year. This year we donated \$335 to Lakes Crisis Center, \$200 to our youth group and \$135 to the church for operating expenses. I want to give a special shout out to all of the youth that volunteered at the event this year! We had such a nice mix of ages all working together.

Because of all the great items that were donated we were even able to use leftover Christmas Store gifts to fill 30 Angel Tree tags in the days before Christmas.

As a reminder, this is a year-round operation, and the **Christmas Store accepts donations anytime of the year!** We always have a bin inside the doors of the church office.

The "Faithful Few"

Encouraging others to become a part of the ministry.

Many congregations suffer because everything appears to run smoothly on the surface. Attendees often don't realize the same small group of "faithful few" is nearing burnout to maintain that appearance. Relying on the same 20% of the people to do 80% of the work is no longer sustainable. Volunteers are increasingly resistant to roles that feel like "unpaid work" rather than meaningful ministry. What are the benefits to being a steward of the church? Here are my thoughts:



1. **Spiritual Growth and Discipleship**

Serving is often described as "discipleship in action." It allows individuals to move beyond being passive observers to active participants in their faith.

Modeling Christ: Jesus provided the ultimate example of a servant-leader, stating he "came not to be served but to serve" (Matthew 20:28).

Discovering Spiritual Gifts: Helping provides a platform to discover and develop unique talents, such as hospitality, teaching or administration, intended for the "common good" (1 Cor. 12:7).

Witnessing Transformation: Volunteers often have a "front-row seat" to seeing God change lives, which directly increases their own faith.

2. **Building Authentic Community**

Volunteering is the fastest way to feel connected to a church. In 2026, church trends emphasize creating "spaces to know and be known," moving away from large programs toward intimate, team-based relationships.

Deep Bonds: Working side-by-side on a ministry team fosters lifelong friendships and a sense of belonging.

Support Networks: Being part of a serving team creates a natural support system where members "bear one another's burdens".

3. **Mental and Physical Health Benefits**

Research consistently shows that serving others provides a "helper's high," releasing endorphins and dopamine that improve overall well-being.

Reduced Depression: Regular church service attendance and volunteering are linked to a 29% lower likelihood of depression.

Longevity: Older adults who volunteer at least 100 hours per year (about 2 hours a week) report better physical health and increased longevity.

Purpose and Perspective: Shifting focus from personal problems to the needs of others reduces stress and provides a profound sense of purpose.

4. **Impact on the Community**

Churches act as essential social safety nets. In 2026, leaders are prioritizing "community first" approaches to ensure local needs are met.

Meeting Practical Needs: Church volunteers staff food pantries, host job fairs, and provide support for those in recovery.

Economic and Social Boost: Communities with active churches often see lower crime rates and higher levels of charitable work.

Testimony of Faith: Acts of service serve as a practical demonstration of God's love to neighbors, often more effectively than words alone.

Give praise to the LORD, proclaim his name; make known among the nations what he has done. Sing to him, sing praise to him; tell of all his wonderful acts. Glory in his holy name; let the hearts of those who seek the LORD rejoice. 1 Chronicles 16:8-10

Oaklyn and I stopped at the mailroom on our way to the apartment. Oaklyn likes having responsibility for the keys when we are together. As soon as we reached the apartment, she handed me the day's mail which contained a small package.

"What's in the package Grandma?"

One rip of the plain brown paper revealed its contents. "It's a Christmas present I got you."

Her response threw me – with face immediately turned away from me and her hand raised as a stop sign, "Grandma! Do NOT let me see that! Take it out of here!"

I packed it away in my bedroom, puzzled by her reaction.

Later, when we opened presents for her birthday, her Papa asked what day he could take her to pick out her present. Again, an unexpected reply.

"Papa, don't you know what you're giving me?"

"Yes" Papa clarified. "I know what I want to give you, but there are different kinds and I want you to choose the one you like."

"But Papa, then I'll know what it is!"

She seemed unsettled about the plan so later I asked her why she wasn't more excited about Papa's idea.

"I want it to be a surprise. When I take the wrapping off, I want the surprise when I see the present inside."

My brother recently lost his 17-year battle with congestive heart failure, just shy of his 72nd birthday. For 17 years he carefully tracked and wrote down his stats, revealing the propensity for detail that was part of his engineering nature. He far exceeded the two to five-year life expectancy predicted in 2008.

The freezing weather paused the latest engineering project Mike was supervising just in time for hunting season to reward him with a welcome deer that broke the last couple "deer drought" years.

As I sat beside him in the hospital I thought of the words "Be patient then brothers and sisters until the Lord's coming." Mike patiently continued the path set before him, keeping on keeping on until he no longer could. He knew his Father's house had room prepared for him, although he had no idea what that would be like. "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see."

Oaklyn was patient waiting for the "surprise" when she pulled the wrapping off her presents. She knew the giver's love and protection. And Mike was patient waiting for the promised "surprise" waiting for him at the end of his faithful life, because he knew God's love and grace.

I trust God to help me remain patient and mindful of the "surprises" that life throws my way, as I seek to become a more faithful follower of His.

A record number of quilts were made in 2025. The **totals include 179 large quilts** (60 inches by 80 inches or larger); **148 baby quilts** and **12 lap quilts or pillows**. These numbers do not include the items which were donated to the Children's Christmas Store.

Large quilts were donated to the following organizations: Lutheran World Relief (121); Asheville, NC for Hurricane Helene relief (29); Food Pantry (16); gifts to First Lutheran Staff (4); Denim quilts filling client orders (5); Donated for raffle to FLC Youth/Lakes Crisis Center (2); Blessing Closet (2).

Baby quilts were donated to the Blessing Closet (3); Asheville, NC for Hurricane Helene relief (8); Food Pantry (33); Health Resources (25); MAHUBE (65); Hospice (8); and Emergency Room (6).

We often receive donations of fabrics, that have the United States flag, eagle, or are red, white and blue with designs that are decidedly related to the United States. Quilts with these types of fabrics cannot be sent overseas. Lap quilts and pillows were made using the fabrics and were donated to Oak Crossing and the Frazee Care Center for veterans living there.



Add the numbers together and the **grand total is 339!** We hope the quilts will bless those who receive them. Truthfully, those of us who meet and make the items are blessed by the time we spend with each other. Join us.
