After an unplanned break due to Vanman Associates closing, the Dream Big Committee has selected a new architect, YHR from Moorhead. YHR created three preliminary drawings which the committee reviewed and provided input on. YHR took the input and made adjustments, bringing updated drawings and ballpark estimates to a meeting at the end of January. The council will review work to date on January 28th and determine a path for congregational input. Initial meetings with our capital campaign consultant also started in January, with the goal of a 2025 campaign. 



Sometimes we may forget the joy found in serving one another through love, the love for which we can serve as a conduit from God to our neighbors. Whether it's something that requires us to "sign-up," show-up, or just respond in love to the neighbor in front of us, these opportunities to share God's love bring true joy to us and others, faithfully serving and helping grow His kingdom on Earth.

PIECEMAKERS

The quilts we make are fabric and thread. We enjoy each other's company and making the quilts. As the quilts are finished, we count and pack them and send them on their way. Most go to Lutheran World Relief. Some are donated locally and, as I noted before, 12 large quilts and 8 baby quilts were mailed to Ashville, North Carolina, following Hurricane Helene.



The quilts were sent to Andy and Tonya Marthaler who own a store in Ashville and agreed to act a liaison between the First Lutheran Quilters and those in need in Ashville. (You may remember Mark and Vicki Marthaler, Tony and Andy, who were members of First Lutheran Church.)

Recently the Quilters received a Thank You letter from Tonya and we wish to share portions of the letter with you:

"To each and every precious person who contributed to the quilts sent for the people tragically affected by the flooding from Hurricane Helene.... Thank you!"

"Your generosity of time and talent in the presence of so much loss is a blessing that means more than words could ever say."

"So many quilts were found when the waters receded. Everyone did their best to try and find the original owners. I think it's because everyone understands the labor of love and how many memories are tied to each and every piece of fabric and stitch."

"Currently there are 11 families we are partnering to help for Christmas. We will be sharing the quilts with these families. Please keep these families in your prayers. Two in particular stand out to me."

"A mom with four children; their father was killed in the flood waters. She is struggling to come to terms with the trauma they experienced, and losing her husband. Unfortunately, she tried to kill herself – thank the Lord she wasn't successful. She is currently in treatment while the kids are with grandparents. I am praying they are all together again soon. Some of the quilts will go to this family."

"Another family is a single Mom of two kids; one is a fourteen-year-old boy. He courageously helped his family to safety in all the flood waters. They will also receive a quilt."

"Prayers for each of these 11 families would be such a gift."

"There are so many tragic stories, but just as many stories of heroism and the kindness of strangers. Opening the boxes made my eyes water – knowing people so far away care so much is genuinely a blessing that brings us all right back to Jesus."

"Thank you again for thinking of the precious souls here in Western North Carolina, thank you for praying."

The letter was read to us during coffee break. There was a moment of silence when the reader finished. To say we were touched is an understatement. As quilts are packed and mailed, we hope the quilts will bless the receivers. Actually, hearing the stories of recipients is humbling.

We are preparing another box of quilts for Ashville as the Marthaler family is willing to connect the quilts with needy recipients. There will be need for some time to come in Ashville, as in many other areas of the country and world.

February Noisy Offering Recipient – Global Health Ministries



Noisy offering collected in February will help support Global Health Ministries (GHM).

GHM is an independent Lutheran nonprofit established in 1987, and specializes in capacity-building for Lutheran health systems in under-resourced countries, serving some of the most vulnerable people in the world.

They believe all people should have access to a healthy life.

Each year thousands of volunteers gather in a Minnesota-based warehouse to help sort and pack medical equipment and supplies to share around the world. At the request of international partners GHM also offer grants and volunteer consultants to help build local health care organization capacity to move the needle on health in their communities and effect sustainable and enduring change.

Global Health Ministries journeys together with our brothers and sisters in Christ, where Lutheran churches manage hospitals, clinics, and grassroots efforts - all focused on improving the health of even the most vulnerable. They focus on strengthening health systems through three integrated strategies: Leadership, Medical Supplies, and Grassroots Efforts.

GHM has active projects in thirteen lower-income countries around the world, where they work with partners who last year touched the lives of more than 1 million people. Their work takes them to Africa, Asia, and Central America, where each of their partners shares a commitment to serve those on the margins, and has asked GHM to collaborate with them to improve community health.






