NOTICE OF ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SUNDAY, MAY 18, 2025

Dear Members of First Lutheran Church,

You are warmly invited to attend our Annual Congregational Meeting on **Sunday, May 18, 2025**, following worship in the sanctuary (approximately a 10:35 a.m. call to order). This important gathering is a time for us to come together as a congregation to review the past year, look ahead to the future, and exercise our shared responsibility in the life of our church.

During the meeting, we will vote on our 2025–2026 Fiscal Year Budget, elect candidates to leadership positions, approve past meeting minutes, review any old or new business, and hear reports from our Pastor, Vision Council, Treasurer, and others. Baptized and Confirmed members of First Lutheran Church are eligible to vote. In accordance with our Constitution, voting on elections and the approval of the final annual budget will be conducted by secret ballot.

Please note that according to our Constitution, the quorum required to conduct business is reached at 50 voting members, and voting by proxy or absentee ballot is not permitted.

Your presence and participation are vital to the health and vitality of our congregation and for the discernment of where God is calling us. Please make plans to stay after worship and join us in this important work as we continue to live out our mission together!

Thought Tidbit: While I named last time that Lent is perhaps my favorite season of the church year, I'm going to give an unpopular opinion here: Easter is my least favorite. Mainly, because of how cliché and capitalistic the day has become. But also because our focus on Easter leans so heavily, at least most often, *in the future*. Christ has risen today, hallelujah! And yet we immediately shift to, 'when Christ will come again?' What happened to His rising, *today*? So in this Easter season and the subsequent days after, I challenge myself and invite you all in, in recognizing the significance of Christ's resurrection *right now, today*. But our present moment is radically changed, knowing that the risen Christ is here today. Let us live into the presence of the risen Christ in every present moment.

Adult Faith Formation

Loving Our Adult Neighbors with Disabilities

Continuing with our current theme of Loving Our Neighbors, the Adult Faith Formation Team hosted speaker Sarah Hill, Executive Director of the Becker County Developmental Achievement Center (DAC) on Sunday, March 30th. Sarah shared that the DAC has been empowering adults with disabilities since 1967, providing services that embrace differences and enrich lives. The mission of the DAC is to foster independence, build confidence, and create opportunities for every individual they serve. At the heart of their work is a deep belief in the value and potential of every person.

Their programs include:

- Day Habilitation – helping individuals build life skills, confidence, and social connections,
- Employment & VRS Services – supporting meaningful employment and career development,
- In-Home Supports – promoting independence and safety in daily living.

While the DAC is proud to partner with the Minnesota Department of Human Services, much of what they do is only possible because of the generosity of our community. From volunteers to donors to local partners, our support makes a lasting difference. Donations to fund services and support new opportunities, community connections to spread their mission and strengthen their outreach, and volunteers to help with programs and activities are essential to their work. Some possible volunteer activities include visiting the DAC and conversing with clients, playing games with clients, or providing and serving a meal at one of the DAC monthly meetings. For you were called to freedom, brethren, only do not turn your freedom into an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another. For the whole law is fulfilled in one word, in the statement, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Galatians 5:13-14

Oaklyn was helping me "review" some children's books donated to the church library. One particular book told of two girls who lived on opposite sides of a fence – each taught to never cross that fence. Friends of one girl gathered on her side of the fence, but the other girl was alone and yearned to join the others in community.

Of course, this caused my social Oaklyn no end of anxiety. She so wanted them to be able to play together.


The two girls eventually came together sitting on the fence, where they had a much better view of the world around them. Soon, other friends joined them in play and in sitting on the fence, a much better vantage point. At the end of the summer, one of the girls reckoned, "Someday somebody's going to come along and knock this old fence down."

Oaklyn was relieved the girls could be together, but then asked, "Who built that fence to start with?" She could not understand why people would separate them.


But the truth is, people built fences even in Jesus's day – social or political status, which leader's teaching they followed, which foods they ate, or whether the men were circumcised or not.

And we continue to either build fences today or cling to old, broken-down ones that may have no relevancy as we come to know and understand each other better. Fences can provide safety, but they can also divide us, or take away our freedom, or dampen our joy in community.

I need to figure out which fences to hold on to (one old fence kept me from getting lost in the woods during deer hunting), and which ones I need to help tear down.




Us What We Carry by Amanda Gorman. Bestselling author and presidential inaugural poet Amanda Gorman captures a shipwrecked moment in time and transforms it into a lyric of hope and healing. In *Call Us What We Carry*, Gorman explores history, language, identity, and erasure through an imaginative and intimate collage. Harnessing the collective grief of a global pandemic, this beautifully designed volume features poems in many inventive styles and structures and shines a light on a moment of reckoning. *Call Us What We Carry* reveals that Gorman has become our messenger from the past, our voice for the future.

The Little Rabbit Who Wanted Red Wings by Carolyn Bailey. When a little bunny wishes for red wings and his wish comes true, everything is not as he had expected it to be. This classic tale is as beloved today as it was when it was written over 50 years ago.




The Other Side by Jacqueline Woodson. A story of friendship across a racial divide. Clover, the young African-American narrator, lives beside a fence that segregates her town. Her mother instructs her never to climb over to the other side because it isn't safe. But one summer morning, Clover notices a girl on the other side. Both children are curious about one another, and as the summer stretches on, Clover and Annie work up the nerve to introduce themselves. They dodge the injunction against crossing the fence by sitting on top of it together, and Clover pretends not to care when her friends react strangely at the sight of her sitting side by side with a white girl. Eventually, it's the fence that's out of place, not the friendship.



Then Sings My Soul by Robert J. Morgan. Three hundred of the world's greatest hymn stories.

Beautiful Bible Stories by Patricia Summerlin Martin. This book is every story in the Bible, in order from Genesis to Acts. All have said that it has increased their Bible knowledge tremendously. I recommend it for any person, at any age, who wants to know what the Bible is about, but wants it in small, easily digestible chunks. The author is very good at keeping the stories true to scripture while necessarily abbreviating them for understanding and clarity
