#### Pastoral Transition: Grief & the Road Ahead

As a community we will continue to grieve Pr. Lauryl's departure into retirement, as well as celebrate her many dynamic years of ordained ministry. We will grieve because of the love she shared and because of the love with which she led – she deeply impacted so many of us with her pastoral presence, and that such a chapter of FLC has ended necessitates quite the grieving process, even if we also celebrate her achievement of retired life.

Amid our grief and gratitude, we also look to the logistical side of transition. The next steps for our community include the formation of a *Call Committee*. This committee helps us find and discern the calling of our next Associate Pastor

According to our Constitution our Call Committee is to be made up of six to 10 voting members of the congregation, and they are elected by the Vision Council (**C13.05**). This committee has a structured and critical road ahead – so first things first, pray for them and support them with love, grace, and encouragement as they take on this vital role.

After their formation and authorization, the Call Committee works with the Northwestern Minnesota Synod to map out the path ahead. They will undergo orientation by synodical leadership in at least their first couple meetings. Then, their next task is to do some congregational self-study, to gain more clarity about who we are, whom God is calling us to be, and therefore gain a better idea of what type of pastor we're looking for.

Advantageously, we've recently done self-study work in '19/'20 as you worked to call Pr. Lauryl and myself, and we've done this quite extensively through our recent strategic planning in '21/'22 where we gathered data through Cottage Meetings. Our analysis of your feedback revealed four core areas of investment to emphasize at FLC: worship, fellowship/discipleship, staff empowerment, and building & grounds. This is all to say, a lot of self-study groundwork has already been laid for the Call Committee. Hopefully this empowers them to move efficiently. Still, as my dad would tell me before every single basketball game, "Be quick, but don't hurry." We can be urgent, but still must be thorough and not rushed.

After the self-study is complete, the committee passes their paperwork to the Synod. The Synod will start matching our paperwork with viable and compatible candidates. Along the way, the committee can also receive names from the congregation to consider. This will be the stage of 'receiving names and interviewing candidates.' Once we get to this point, we're about 70% of the way to welcoming our next Associate Pastor. \*NOTE: during this time, the Call Committee must adhere to strict confidentiality since, for many pastoral candidates, their livelihoods, and the health of the parishes they might be currently serving are at stake. As much as the committee might want to give you specific information about a candidate, they cannot.

Eventually, the Call Committee will discern a candidate that best fits; at that point, they'll recommend the "candidate for call...In consultation with the [candidate], the call committee presents a summary of their recommendation to the [Vision Council] for their approval. Confidentiality needs to remain a top priority"<sup>1</sup> at this stage.

From there, proper negotiations would take place, a background check would be conducted, and upon Vision Council approval, a congregational meeting would be called to vote upon the recommended candidate for Associate Pastor!

This road ahead could be reasonably quick, and we could possibly be welcoming someone in March or April. The discernment process could also hit any number of variables: pastor shortage, a struggle to find the right fit, lastminute variables could cause one party to back out in the late stages of the process, etc. In other words, the Synod also cautioned that this could take as long as 18 months or more. I don't anticipate that, but we need to be ready for anything.

#### **PIECEMAKERS**

This month's quilt measuring 58 inches x 77 inches is a colorful one and is available for purchase. The three layers are tied (held together with yarn). A pieced top that is tied, is often called a comforter.

What was the quiltmaker thinking as she pieced the squares? Was she remembering where each fabric bit started? Is the red and white stripe extra fabric from making a Raggedy Ann doll for a grandchild? Are the ginghams from a child's dress, or leftover from making kitchen curtains? Some of the small squares are pieced. Are they extra blocks from an earlier project? Were the blocks the wrong size, or did the maker accidently piece too many?

Did she make the quilt simply because she enjoyed each step in the process? Did she have help? Or was she thinking about the person who would eventually receive the quilt?

Each fabric, block and quilt has a story. We don't usually know what the story is, but we can appreciate how the individual fabrics work together to create a colorful quilt. And so it is with us. Most people belong to a group or groups who meet together for a purpose. It may be to make quilts, or to work with wood. It may be to teach children, or serve a meal. We don't know everyone's story, but we can join together to provide meals and quilts and comfort to each other – those we know and those we don't know.

The building of First Lutheran Church is one of our greatest assets and tools for participating in God's work in the world. Just take a moment to see why:

Our diverse and intergenerational ministries take place here: our space enables the faith formation of hundreds of kids in our Youth and Family Ministry programs every week, as well as the myriad of Adult Faith Formation opportunities. Our spaces house four different types of worship services from Sunday services to Wednesday worship, to summer outdoors. Our spaces provide for small group bible studies, quilting, parish health events, meal making ministries, social assistance, Creation Care, and SO MUCH MORE!

Not only that, our building also empowers us to be active community partners for our neighbors: we host local functions from public elections to Sons of Norway. We host and have hosted everything from low-income dental health services to community blood drives. We also regularly host a whole range of support groups from LSS Respite Care to grief support. Our building houses community music events, private lessons, Tae Kwon Do classes, and even provides kitchen space to multiple small businesses amid a commercial kitchen shortage. We also host five-day-a-week childcare amid a massive childcare deficit in our community. Our parking lot provides space not only for all the above, but community partners and community events from the Street Faire to Crazy Days!

Again, our building is one of our greatest assets for forming and nourishing our vibrant congregation, and also for impactfully serving our neighbor - and it is YOUR generosity that sustains all of this. Non of the above exists without your gifts.

For part of November, and especially on November 16th (Give to the Max Day in Minnesota) we are inviting you all into a campaign that will help us service the recent and crucial investments we've made in our building and property - investments that help us be and serve community.

These investments include critical repairs to our patio on the south lawn that provides shelter to our offices, but also provides for outdoor worship; we've also invested in a new, safer, and more serviceable parking lot; finally, we've overhauled our HVAC system for the sanctuary. These projects have required a \$225k loan which we hope to payback with our general fund, but also with campaigns like Give to the Max.

#### **Quarterly Financial Stewardship Report: General Fund Giving and Expenses**

Thank you for the many ways you have supported the ministry of First Lutheran Church in the last three months through your financial gifts and your gifts of time and talent. Our faith community would not be as healthy as we are without good stewards like you. We are a financially healthy congregation.

When you look back through the giving records of the last five years, you will discover that the "summer months" (July through September) have seen the lowest giving totals. The giving totals for the past three months this year support that historical trend. In our budget, we estimated the income for the quarter would be \$164,124.00. The actual income total for July 1 through September 30, 2023 is **\$150,224.82**. This is \$13,899.18 less than what we expected in our budget estimates for the quarter.

In the estimates we established in our budget, we planned to spend \$176,818.00 to support the <u>ministry of First</u> <u>Lutheran Church</u> in this first quarter of our fiscal year. <u>The actual **expenses** totaled **\$159,688.44** during the quarter. The difference between the budgeted expense total for the quarter and the actual expenses for the quarter is \$17,129.56.</u>

The difference between actual giving and actual expenses for the quarter is **-\$9,463.62**.

Some of the notable investments we made during the quarter include upgrading computer hardware, software, and phone systems, resolution of plumbing issues, and dry-testing our fire-suppression system.

There are two points of good news to consider as we move forward. First, we started this fiscal year with a balance of \$102,811.03 in the General Fund. Second, historically December giving has exceeded all estimates. Last year, 16 percent of our yearly total was given in December. We anticipate that this December's giving will again exceed expectations.

We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith; if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully. (Romans 12: 6-8)

The good news is that you've been made ready to a large degree. FLC's recent history has been one full of staff transitions, and prior to that, a significant period where there was no pastor at all and only pulpit supply. In other words, you and the staff have the muscle for this.

With that, here are the members of your Call Committee, called and formed to find our next Associate Pastor. Again, please hold these folks in prayer as they embark on this work:

<u>Now, what do we do in the *interim*?</u> This can go several directions, and possibly will. Before our next Associate Pastor, we could bring on a full-time interim pastor. An interim often (but not always) becomes quite fully a part of the life of the congregation – office presence, present at all worship services, staff meetings, Vision Council meetings, etc. It can be an intensive onboarding, but a helpful investment especially for a long-term period without a pastor.

Now, there are at least two challenges to note: 1) there's an extreme shortage of interim pastors, and 2) finding and onboarding an interim would require a lot of time and energy in the near-term. Meanwhile, we'll also be welcoming Olivia (our new YFM Director), navigating Call Committee work, and entering seasonally busy church life.

Therefore, because of the interim shortage and the logistical challenge that is seeking, interviewing, and onboarding a full-time interim pastor, we're going to wait until after the new year to consider pursuing a full-time interim – and, thankfully, we can pursue a different type of supplement to pastoral leadership for the near-term, at least between now and the start of the new year.

With the Synod's help, we are pursuing a **Vice Pastor** – a vice pastor doesn't integrate fully into the life of the congregation the same way an interim pastor does. A vice pastor is basically contracted for specific pastoral services. They do not attend staff meetings, they don't attend leadership and ministry meetings like Vision Council or Personnel or Stewardship, etc. They basically meet the existing pastor and staff where they are at and fill very specific gaps.

Currently, we have a possible candidate, and the Synod and I are working with them on their availability and comfortability with supplementing my pastoral leadership in likely three areas: occasional pulpit supply (preaching & leading worship), routine visitation ministry, and back up funeral assistance (especially if I am on vacation).

I know this is A LOT! More than anything, I want to say that I am confident in FLC navigating through this moment. As usual, we ask for your grace, flexibility, and encouragement as we do so together. God bless you all.

#### Mentoring You, Mentoring Me

And how is it that we each hear them in our own language to which we were born? Parthians and Medes and Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea, and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia. Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the districts of Libya around Cyrene and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes. Cretans and Arabs – we hear them in our own tongues speaking of the mighty deeds of God. Acts 2:8-11

There is so much to be grateful for in our lives every day, but this is the month we try to be more intentional about expressing our gratitude. I loved the beautiful frost and snow-covered trees last winter. The joy and hopefulness of spring arrived with the first crocuses, leaf buds, and yes – even dandelions. Summer's sun warmed us, and along with late arriving

rain, coaxed our huge variety of flowers (cultivated and wild) to pop across our landscape. And now our thankfulness extends to the array of fall colors. Two red, three orange, two yellow, and two green trees clumped together breathtakingly along the highway – one of so many settings along the road. With God's help, I hope I continue getting better at also appreciating the uniqueness of each person in my life's path.

I spent a two and one-half years mentoring a beautiful young Somali mom on her journey to learn more English, get through a divorce, and become a US citizen. She had been a lab technician in her native land with only a smattering of conversational English, which had to improve before she could go to college and realize her deepest dream – to become a nurse or doctor. Her young son's chronic illness was the only thing that took her eyes off those goals. As her use of English expanded, her job at the turkey plant changed to include communicating company policies and information to other Somali employees. Islam was her faith tradition.

I entered the mentoring program very prayerfully – asking God to help me move forward with love. Those prayers continued with each mentoring session, which expanded from once a week to twice a week at her request – she was so focused and determined. Divorce and citizenship are both very costly in immigration court, and each step in the process required a trip to Minneapolis/St. Paul, for which she had to find a ride. We met late afternoon or early evening depending on her work schedule.


Our very first session fell during her prayer time. I could see how anxious she was because she didn't want to keep me waiting, but also wanted to do her prayers. I told her I was okay waiting the few minutes she practiced her prayers, and she was visibly relieved. I have heard various motivations assigned to strict adherence to Islamic prayer time, but what I witnessed was a level of devotion to God that made mine seem somewhat paltry. In the book "Love Without Limits", author Jacqueline Bussie states many Islamic people plan their lives around their faith, while we tend to plan our faith practices around our lives. It was certainly true for my mentee.

We ordered a Somali-English dictionary and went to the library so she could get a card and check out a tape player, tapes, and a book that had the translations. She studied every available minute that wasn't taken up by her job or her son and she progressed rapidly. I helped her order the citizenship study book which she memorized, giving her a more thorough understanding of our history and laws than many people who have lived here all their lives.

Her wonderful and supportive parents moved to the cities. The deadline was approaching to finalize the divorce in immigration court. If she didn't get it done before citizenship was granted, she had to start all over in the US court system. She felt her English improved enough so she could enroll in the bilingual anatomy and biology classes offered in the cities. It was time for her to move.

I feel I learned as much as she did in our sessions. The hijab cleared away societal expectations based on appearance and allowed me to see the strong, faithful, intelligent woman she was. Her level of devotion to her Islamic faith traditions was to be envied and led me to be a more devoted Christian. Their menu includes lots of fish, chicken, goat, and camel, and she was shocked to discover one of her favorite meats at Larry's Supermarket was from pig (instantly eliminated from her diet). We still have so much prejudice in our communities and institutions (driver's license test). We had so much to laugh about together. Caring for our children was paramount for both of us. We did very well eating eggs together – she likes the yolks and I prefer the whites. She worked so hard for things we either take for granted or don't recognize for the gifts they are. When we listened with our hearts and souls, lovingkindness flowed. I am so grateful for the time we had together.




New reads for cooler days. Should be available in the library by Thanksgiving.






