ASTOR JOE'S UPDATE

Update from Lead Pastor Joe Skogmo

September is upon us!

The fall season can be intensely nostalgic, can't it? I wonder why. Is it the smell of the changing seasonal air bringing back school or sports memories of yesteryear? Is it literally the decaying leaves and browning vegetation that make us consciously or subconsciously wrestle with the fact that time marches on, that nothing can stay the same? All the above? In any case, fall tends to be full of nostalgia.

And nostalgia is a wild human experience, isn't it? The moment it strikes is such an existential shockwave – looking at an old photo, finding old dishware, preparing baby clothes for the rummage sale, seeing an old toy, hearing an old song, smelling familiar perfume or cologne, whatever it may be – when nostalgia



hits us...it HITS us. Then there is the *tension* experienced within nostalgia: is it joyful? Is it forlorn? Is it comforting? Is it heartache? Is it all the above?

Yes. Nostalgia is an emotional spectrum.

The emotional fusion of nostalgia is actually in the word itself. Nostalgia is a word that has Greek roots, and those Greek roots are fascinating. Nostalgia is a combination of two Greek words: *nostos* and *algos*. *Nostos* ( $v \dot{o} \sigma \tau \sigma \varsigma$ ) means 'to return,'<sup>1</sup> to experience a 'homecoming.' And *algos* ( $\dot{\alpha}\lambda\gamma\sigma\varsigma$ ) means pain or suffering.<sup>2</sup> Is that not the contradictive experience of nostalgia!? –a homecoming but tinged with woe –a feel good return home but filled with ache –a return but to a place that no longer *is*.

A two-edged sword, and even each edge is complicated. For instance, the 'feel-good' edge of nostalgia: on one hand, it can bring us to cherished, heartwarming memories, and these feel-good memories can bring us to gratitude and hope for the future!

On the other hand, the researcher and author, Brené Brown, says that the 'feel-good' parts of nostalgia can also be 'dangerous' because it can bring us to a place of comparison which never lets the present live up to the past – in this way, nostalgia can be a thief of joy; more dangerous yet, nostalgia can seduce us into telling a story that never was. Read this excerpt from Brown's book *Rising Strong:* 

Nostalgia sounds relatively harmless, even like something to indulge in with a modicum of comfort...But it's also dangerous. In fact, in the case of my own family, the seduction of nostalgia bordered on lethal.

When you're raised by a wild pack of storytellers the way I was, nostalgia is the currency of the realm...No matter how many times we heard the tales, we loved them, and we loved knowing that a little outlaw blood coursed through our veins. But the truth cut right through the nostalgia of those stories...

Looking at that map [of our family's history], I realized that much of what had been dressed up as hard [outlaw] living was really addiction and mental health issues. Yes, there were wonderful folkloric stories of struggle, triumph, and rebellion, but there was also story after story of trauma and loss.

...Sometimes, the deep love we feel for our parents or the sense of loyalty to our family often create a mythology that gets in the way of our efforts to look past nostalgia and toward truth.

...I also don't frame my own wild stories as war stories from "the good old days." Yes, I have wonderful family memories and stories of crazy adventures that I love to share, but when it comes to addiction, medical histories, and mental health, I believe that nostalgia is deadly.<sup>3</sup>

## LAURYL'S WORD

Update from Pastor Lauryl Ivers, Associate Pastor

Dear First Lutheran family,

All of us go through transitions and changes in our lives, and I'm going through a major one right now. My hope is that I will manage retirement in a healthy and hopeful way for the beloved congregation I'm serving, and for myself. I don't know if I mentioned that before I became a pastor, one of the departments I managed in a Seattle bank, was "Problem and Change Management". That must have been part of God's plan of training for me



since I've had many opportunities to work on this! One of my favorite books is called <u>Welcoming Change – Discovering</u> <u>Hope in Life's Transitions</u>, by James E. Miller. Rev. Miller talks about three phases of change: endings, transitions, and beginnings. I keep going back to reread some of the wise things he says:

All change is uncomfortable. Even when it's desired, change can be disturbing...it introduces the unknown, the uncertain... .strong emotions may arise within you, ones you'd rather not face, or ones you don't know <u>how</u> to face. You always have a choice, the choice of how you'll respond.

**Endings:** What we call a beginning is often an ending, and to make an end is to make a beginning. The end is where we start from. ...The best route to take is <u>through</u> your endings, not around them...express your feelings, not hide them... Whether the loss is major or minor, the result is the same: <u>a sense of grief</u>.

**Transitions**: Even if the change is one you've looked forward to, you'll probably experience "in-between" feelings nonetheless, for you must let go of what has been, before you can grasp what will be. ... Two processes are at work here: one is the external change... the other process, your internal transition, is altogether different. Renewal is taking place ever so gradually. If you push ahead too quickly, you'll restrict what's forming carefully, fragilely.

**New Beginnings**: Your beginnings are no more important than your endings, no more worthwhile than your interim periods. They're simply that next step in your growth, another chance to become more completely who you're meant to be.... You can abide with the unknown, confident that the Unknowable already abides with you, and always will.

My friends, may God be with you to comfort you in the grief of changes, to encourage you through the transitional times, and to bring blessings in the new beginnings of all the changes in your life,

## **Suicide Prevention Awareness Month**

Suicidal thoughts, much like mental health conditions, can affect anyone regardless of age, gender, or background. In fact, suicide is often the result of an untreated mental health condition. Suicidal thoughts, although common, should not be considered normal and often indicate more serious issues.

September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month —a time to raise awareness of this stigmatized, and often taboo, topic. During this month the goal is to shift public perception, spread hope and share vital information to people affected by suicide, and also ensuring that individuals, friends and families have access to the resources they need to discuss suicide prevention and to seek help.

- <u>79%</u> of all people who die by suicide are male.
- Although <u>more women</u> than men attempt suicide, men are <u>4x</u> more likely to die by suicide.
- Suicide is the <u>2nd leading</u> cause of death among people <u>aged 10–14</u> and the 3rd leading cause of death among people <u>aged 15</u> <u>-24</u> in the U.S.
- Suicide is the <u>12th leading</u> cause of death overall in the U.S.
- <u>46%</u> of people who die by suicide had a diagnosed mental health condition but research shows that <u>90%</u> may have experienced symptoms of a mental health condition.

To help raise awareness, FLC has invited **Scott Geiselhart** to speak during Wednesday worship on **September**, **27**<sup>th</sup> **at 6:00PM**. His presentation, <u>Seeing In Color Again</u>, is an inspirational presentation that educates audiences about PTSD, addiction, and suicide. Scott was one of the first firefighters in the country to talk about his experience with PTSD, addiction, and his suicide-attempt. You will hear about his very personal journey that took him from a very dark place to post traumatic success. This presentation will take the place of a worship service for the night. All ages are welcome to listen to Scott talk about his journey and how to get help. For those who wish to attend, but do not think their children are ready for such sensitive content, there will be volunteers in the Rec Room leading various activities for youth and families who desire an alternative option.

## PIECEMAKER

### ~The FLC Quilters~

This month's quilt is an interesting one. The blocks were donated to the quilters years ago. They are hand embroidered and depict the first 13 colonies as they entered statehood. The embroidery includes the shape of each state, the state flower, the state bird, the year the colony entered statehood, the name of the state and its order number. For example, Delaware was the "1st of the 13", and Rhode Island enlarged here, was "13th of the 13."

Thirteen is an unusual number of blocks for a quilt. Many quilters looked at the blocks and puzzled over a setting. At one point the embroidered blocks received the blue strips along the top and bottom. There wasn't enough of the pretty blue to do more and the blocks languished again. This spring, an enterprising quilter took the blocks home, designed the setting, found material in her own collection of fabric for borders and completed the quilt top. It was then machine quilted and bound. The quilt is available for viewing on the railing at the top of the stairs near the elevator.

I'm sure the person who embroidered the blocks, whoever she or he may be, would be glad to know their project is complete.

So, when nostalgia stands in the way of 'hard truths,' when it harbors denial of the pain we've experienced in our pasts, when nostalgia rewrites or doesn't fully tell history...it is dangerous. Beware the 'feel-good' parts of nostalgia.

NOW...when it isn't creating dangerous comparisons to the present and when it isn't contributing to denial, nostalgia can also be emboldening. It can be emboldening through the feel-good parts of it and even the aching parts of it!

The feel-good parts of it can stir us to gratitude for the joys in life we've lived. The feel-good parts can also give us hope for the future! This is what nostalgia can be in Scripture. One writer notes: "Throughout the Old Testament, God constantly called people to remember the mighty acts and miracles [God] had performed. By remembering how God had provided for them in the past, the Israelites could rest assured [God] would continue to care for them in the future."<sup>4</sup>

Take this example from Exodus 19:

<sup>4</sup> "You have seen what I did to the Egyptians and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself."

Remembering triumphs of the past can bring gratitude! And, as Michael J. Fox says profoundly, 'gratitude makes optimism sustainable.' Remembering triumphs of the past gives hope for the future!

And in the case of Psalm 145, the psalmist uses the whole psalm to prescribe nostalgia in order sustain hope for each new generation:

<sup>4</sup>One generation shall extol your works to another

- and shall declare your mighty acts.
- <sup>5</sup> They will recount the glorious splendor of your majesty...

Nostalgia can resurrect positive experiences of the past and thereby give rise to strength and hope as we meet the future.

Finally, nostalgia can even be emboldening in the aching parts of it. Nostalgia returns us home, but it also returns us to pain, to aching. Pay attention to that pain and aching.

Name it, because in so doing, nostalgia can help lead us into important griefwork; it can help us name the fact that such times of old are no longer, and we need to grieve that, and feel that...and eventually accept that and *move on*.

Scripture urges this, too. It's good to remember the old. It's good to confront that the past no longer *is*. It is good to grieve that healthily. AND...it is good to not stay there. The prophet Isaiah urges people to not dwell in the past (43):

<sup>18</sup> Do not remember the former things or consider the things of old.
<sup>19</sup> I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth; do you not perceive it?
I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.

If you're confused at this point with what to do with nostalgia, well...first, I think that speaks in and of itself to the complexity and the emotional labyrinth that is nostalgia!

But, according to behavioral research and according to Scripture, let's land here: **Nostalgia can be a beautiful thing**, stirring us to gratitude and hope. <u>And</u> it should be tread lightly – don't let it rewrite history so as to avoid hard truths, don't let it become 'a dangerous form of comparison,' don't let it blind you to the abundance of life now (John 10:10), and don't let it blind you to things that God can make new (Revelation 21:5).

Visit the past with gratitude and love, visit the past to traverse grief, and don't stay there – let go, and look for the God who makes ways in the wilderness of the future.

This event, sponsored and coordinated by the FLC Adult Faith Formation team, was well received by those attending.

Pastor Joe led the study and discussion on Martin Luther and the Reformation as well as Luther's Theology of the Cross vs. the Theology of Glory. To complement this study Don and Janet Bridgers led the music featuring songs like "This Little Light of Mine" and "Give Me Oil in My Lamp". To enhance the study of Martin and Katie Luther, participants reviewed the history of home and commercial beer brewing in Germany. To add some realism to the brewing industry, participants were able to taste test barley as well as wheat beer and two different varieties of root beer. Healthy snacks included trail mix and raw garden vegetables.

Jodi Kuehn coordinated the craft activity of making citronella candles using jars, lemons and limes, and various garden herbs. To close the VBS event, participants enjoyed roasting marshmallows for their s'mores.


