PASTOR JOE'S UPDATE

Update from Lead Pastor Joe Skogmo

Call Committee Update:

As was mentioned in the November Newsletter, our Call Committee – which is a team that does the work of finding our next Associate Pastor – has been established and authorized by the Vision Council as of the end of October!

The Committee is made up of 10 members (9 voting, and the chair is *ex officio*/non-voting). These 10 members are well representative of our various ministries, worshipping communities, and intergenerational makeup. The committee had their first meeting on Sunday, November 12th with a staff member from the Northwestern Minnesota Synod to offer them orientation on the road ahead.

Furthermore, the Call Committee has now also worked with the FLC Vision Council to discern what type of Associate Pastor we are looking for (skillset, job description, experience, etc.) and they are now prepared to begin drafting FLC's *Ministry Site Profile (MSP)*— which is effectively our resume for prospective pastors to gain understanding on who FLC is and where we think God is calling us. Once that *MSP* is completed and submitted to the synod, the committee will wait to start receiving candidates to consider for interviewing.

Please keep the Call Committee and Vision Council in your prayers as they endeavor in such critical work on behalf of our community. On ahead we go!

Vice Pastor Update:

Also mentioned in our November Newsletter: in the immediate interim before we call our next Associate Pastor, we were seeking what is called a 'Vice Pastor.' A Vice Pastor contracts for specific pastoral services. In our case, we were looking for someone to provide occasional preaching supply and worship leadership, someone to provide supplemental and backup pastor care, as well as emergency backup for funeral presiding should I be unable due to illness or travel.

I am delighted to announce that we have found our Vice Pastor! Our very own FLC member, Dr. Roy Hammerling has agreed to vice pastoral services here at FLC. So, in these months ahead Pastor Roy will provide occasional preaching and worship leadership, pastoral care, and possibly preside at funerals in my absence.

I am profoundly thankful for Pr. Roy's willingness to help us out in this way. He has a wealth of pastoral and congregational experience, and he is such a warm and compassionate presence for us. Please check out his bio in this newsletter! We are enormously blessed to receive him as our Vice Pastor in this interim period.



Greetings. For the past thirty years I've had the pleasure of being a member of the Concordia College Religion Department. My area of specialty is the History of Spirituality. I received my PhD from the University of Notre Dame. Before that I was an ELCA pastor in Williston North Dakota. My MDiv is from Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa. Update from Vision Council President Gail Colby

Merry Christmas First Lutheran Church!

The busy holiday season is underway! Along with all our regular business we have all the Christmas activities, concerts, serving and celebrating. I would like to give you quick update on the Call Committee: By the time you read this, they are either in the process of finishing their orientation from the Synod, or have finished it and are in the process of accepting candidates. It is moving along and I ask that you continue your prayers for this process.



Christmas is full of so many things that seem like they don't have anything to do with Christmas that it can be hard to maintain our focus on celebrating the birth of our Savior. There are a lot of non-Christians that celebrate Christmas also. Pew Research Center's new survey reports that two thirds of Christians say Christmas is a religious holiday while non-Christians say it is a "cultural event". So what are the non-Christian's doing to celebrate Christmas? Well, it turns out they decorate a Christmas tree, give gifts, spend time with family and eat big meals together. They sing Christmas carols, read holiday books, do holiday baking, give charitable donations and do volunteering. So they do a lot of the same things I do. I'm not sure it they read the story of Jesus. I'm not sure if they sing Christmas carols about Jesus or if it's just "Grandma got run over by a reindeer." The main difference is no nativity scene and they don't go to a worship service.

So what are we going to do with all these non-Christians celebrating Christmas? Is this okay?!

Well, we might follow the example of Muhammad, a Muslim teacher that Dr. Roy Hammerling met in Pakistan in the Wasir Kahn Mosque. Dr. Hammerling describes in his book, *Speaking of Religion*, how he found himself in a very uncomfortable situation being the only English-speaking American Christian there amongst all the Muslims that had come to pray at the mosque. Muhammad embraced him, called him a brother and invited him to pray along side him as a Christian because they were both believers. He taught him the ritual washing and showed him inclusiveness, grace and love. He introduced him to his students and wanted them to get to know him.

I hate to admit it but Muhammad has made me feel a little bit ashamed of myself. Instead of wondering why someone doesn't worship at a Christmas service, I think this year I will make a legitimate effort to actually invite someone. They might decline. They might change their mind later. If not, keep celebrating our Christian Christmas with the non-Christians in whichever way we can. The Holy Spirit works in amazing ways and I think Muhammad showed us that. Let's focus on inclusiveness and love. Love can break down so many walls no matter how different we may be. I'm going to put out my Nativity Scene. I'm going to eat some Lefse and maybe some Spritz cookies. I'm going to hug and kiss my grandkids, which is easy! But I challenge you all to show some love this Christmas season to someone who needs it. Merry Christmas!

Don'ts:

- Put cotton balls, sticks, pencils, or pens inside your ears.
- Swim or wash in dirty water.
- Listen to music too loudly.
- Share your earbuds or earphones with others.

There is no Sunday/Wednesday School starting December 17th and December 20th.


Classes will resume on January 7th and Jan 10th.

What First Lutheran Church Has in Common with a Bur Oak Tree

When you get a chance, while walking in the woods sit down for a rest and consider a large Bur oak tree. Generally, the larger the trunk, the older the tree. Bur oaks commonly grow to be 200 to 300 years old, and may live up to 400 years. Even without all the leaves and acorns, the majestic structure of the trunk and branches is a wonder to behold. Consider that this amazing living thing has much in common with First Lutheran Church.

Just like a Bur oak, FLC has deep roots. The visible and living church we are today is supported by a firm and extensive foundation of shepherds and saints that have gone on before us. On All Saints Sunday, we remember a few of the many to which we are indebted. Just like the majestic old oak, the deep root system of First Lutheran Church allows us to survive the stresses of high temperatures, humidity, and subzero winters the world brings to bear.



Above ground, the thick bark of the oak trunk allows the tree to be fire-tolerant. The same can be said of FLC. Our liturgy of word and sacrament, tradition, teaching, and faith experiences allow us to endure the fires of the secular world raging around us. Without this thick, fire-tolerant exterior, we would be consumed by the outside influences trying to engulf us.

At the very center of our tree/church is Christ. Through Him all things grow and live.

The extensive branch system of the tree reminds us of the many and varied ministries contributing to the health of the living church. The major branches of our faith community include Adult Faith Formation Team; Altar Guild; AV Technology; Building and Grounds Team; Call Committee; Children's Advisory Team; Children's, Youth & Family Ministry; Christmas Store Volunteers; Counters; Creation Care Team; Decorating/Flower Team/Grounds Beautification Group; Homeless Ministry; Hospitality Team; Leadership Development; Library Organization & Care; LSS Respite Care; Music Ministries; Office Cover; Personnel Team; Prayer Team; Quilters, Sunday/Wednesday School Education Teams; Stewardship Team; Vacation Bible School Volunteers; Vision Council; Visitation Team; Wedding Coordinators; Women's Circles; Worship Assistants; and Youth Ministry Team.

Some may say all "the action" takes place via the smaller branches connected to the major branches. The upward growth, the leaf development, and the fruit production all occur because of the smaller branches. In our comparison, the smaller branches are the individuals (like YOU) who are connected to each of the ministries listed above. None of the larger branches would be able to support the life of the organism without the action of the smaller branches. None of the ministries of First Lutheran would be able to function without the individual volunteers stepping forward, taking initiative, and taking action.

Thank you to the many volunteers who contribute their talents and countless hours to the ministries at First Lutheran. Without you, our faith community would not be a healthy, living, amazing organism. You enable all "the action" to take place and the production of good fruit.

I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. If you do not remain in me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples. (John 15:5-8)





Educational Historical Forum Emmy Award Winning Documentary "The Road to Little Rock" Sunday, January 21 9:30 AM in the FLC Library


In recognition of Martin Luther King Day, Social Justice, and Social Injustice, the FLC Adult Faith Formation Team has invited Carl Oberholtzer to present an "Educational Historical Forum" in the FLC Library at 9:30 a.m. Sunday, January 21. Plan to attend this informative documentary – coffee and pastries will be provided!

Oberholtzer's documentary, which he co-wrote and co-produced, is based on a Civil Rights Story, "The Road to Little Rock", which tells of nine teenagers and one judge who demonstrated enduring positive human qualities of courage, honor, determination, and responsibility. The story begins in 1957 as nine African-American teenagers sought enrollment at an all-white high school in Little Rock, Arkansas. In 1957 many school districts continued to ignore the 1954 US Supreme Court ruling of Brown vs Board of Education, which declared that segregation in public schools was unconstitutional. Viewers will witness the courage and determination demonstrated by the "Little Rock Nine" who sought to attend the high school of their choice.

Social Justice refers to the fair and equitable distribution of resources, opportunities, and privileges in society – fairness in healthcare, employment, housing, and more. In a Socially-Just society, human rights are respected, and discrimination is not allowed to flourish. Social Justice is also about ensuring that everyone has equal economic, political, and social rights and opportunities.

The featured quilt this month is a scrap quilt which measures 60"x80". As you can see, the squares are set in an alternate light and dark pattern. Many different lights and many different darks are used appearing to be this quilters way to use the last bits and pieces of various fabrics. Waste not – want not!


Each time the quilt top was out for the next step in its making, someone would ask: "How many pieces do you think are in this quilt?" Here's the answer: There are 35 rows of 48 squares which equals 1,680 pieces. That's a lot of work and a lot of scraps. As any avid quilter knows, scraps like dust bunnies, multiply in the dark. The person who pieced the quilt top probably has a more.

One photo shows the whole quilt. The second is a closeup which shows a few squares and a portion of the border and binding. The black edge to the right is the binding. The white strip between the binding and the reddish border is called a flange. It adds a nice pop to the edge of the quilt. Although the squares appear crooked in the photo, it is the way the quilt was held, and the angle at which the photo was taken.

As always, if you'd like a closer look, the quilt is on the railing at the top of the steps, and is for sale for \$75.00. The funds from any purchased quilts are used to buy batting and thread to make the quilts that go to Lutheran World Relief. (Another group of quilts will be shipped in December.) Funds may also used to meet various requests within the church. Thank you to all who've made donations of any kind (time, fabric, notions, batting, purchase of quilts, setting up and taking down tables, and more) in 2023.

I finally got to have my very social Oaklyn for the first time since she started kindergarten. She was telling me all about school, including lunch.

"We don't get to pick what we eat." Then her voice became very serious and emphatic. "And there's a problem. I think the teachers need help. They keep telling us to be quiet so they can hear the kids. Grandma - they need hearing aids just like you."



My little sweetheart misconstrued the teachers' messages. She retrieves my hearing aids for me when I've neglected to put them in and have trouble hearing her, so she naturally assumed that was the issue for the teachers as well. But the issue for the teachers was sorting through the chaff to hear the essential messages above all the din caused by many voices bouncing off the cafeteria walls.

I feel a little like the teachers during the run up to Christmas, which tries to break records for the earliest start each year. Black Friday is supposed to connotate when retailers turn their red bottom line to black, but when I was young black meant something else, and I could not understand why people got up so early for a color that clearly signaled "mourning" to me.

Then came Small Business Saturday, stirring up compassion for individuals trying to make it on their own, and offering us the prospect of giving a highly "personalized" gift.

Finally (for now), Cyber Monday, offering the best deals and widest selections for that hard-to-buy-for person or anyone else we might have overlooked.

My inundated email box overflows with exciting offers from vendors known and unknown (and sometimes very questionable).
